magine this...it is your birthday party, hundreds of guest have come for the celebration that you have painstakingly organised. Everyone on the guest list shows up and seemingly appreciates the grand decor, the scrumptious food spread and not to forget the impressive entertainment lineup. Everybody is having a splendid time except you. All your guests have chosen to ignore you and your efforts. In fact they don't remember how they got there? What the event is about? Oblivious that it is your birthday! What a sad depressing thought that is! Hard to imagine or is it?

To be honest, this thought is not far from reality when we think about Christmas. We all know what day of the year Christmas falls on, we look forward to it and the celebration that lead up to the big day... but how many of us know the 'True' meaning of Christmas. Imagine this from Jesus's perspective... being ignored on your birthday. I am sure that a majority of us know the answer already, but the question still remains- What is Christmas without Christ?

Christmas comes once in a year, celebrations begin a month earlier which involves gatherings, dinner parties, gifting, decorations etc. There is nothing wrong in that but as believers we should not forget the true essence of Christmas. So, how do we keep Christ this Christmas?

Sometimes I like to wonder what the Shepherds and the three wise men felt as they witnessed baby Jesus. The Bible tells us that they rejoiced and that the three wise men decided to not go to King Herod as planned. I would like to imagine that prior to them meeting baby Jesus their lives would have been very different. The shepherds were considered of low stature in society. Also, shepherding was a lonely job as they spent a greater part of their time in the fields tending the sheeps alone. On the other hand, the three wise men were regarded as highly respected and knowledgeable patrons because of their travels and discoveries along their somewhat lonely journeys. I wonder how many of us can relate to their experience, cold and lonely, seeking answers in the wrong places with the wrong people. Must be very similar to Christmas without Christ. Many people celebrate Christmas without keeping Christ at the centre. Thankfully there is hope, allow me to take us back to the story of what happened after the shepherds and the three wise men witnessed the birth of Jesus. The Bible says in *Luke 2:20, "The shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all the things they had heard and seen, which were just as they had been told".* And in *Matthew 2:10-11, "When they saw the star, they were overjoyed. On coming to the house, they saw the child with his mother Mary, and they bowed down and worshiped him. Then they opened their treasures and presented him with gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh".*

There is a dramatic change in them from hopelessness to hope, from despair to peace. Being in the presence of Jesus brought the joy of worship in their hearts. It must have been such a transformative experience for them. Friends, what the Shepherds and the three wise men experienced that day captures the rapture of Christmas, allowing Jesus to be born in our hearts. I do believe that after their encounter they must have resumed their normal lives but wiser, stronger in faith and hope because the Savor of the world reigned in their hearts.

The only way that you and I can keep Christ this Christmas and all the Christmas's to come, is to revisit the manger. Just like the shepherds and the three wise men who were filled with joy as they worshipped Jesus, we can also achieve the same. We can do so when we let go of our pride and sinful nature, repent and receive Jesus into our lives. Until and unless Jesus is born in your heart, this celebration will come and go but will have no significance to us. As a child of God, let us not be in the habit of keeping Christ during Christmas or Palm Sunday, Good Friday, Resurrection Sunday but every day till the day He calls us. *"For God so loved the world that He gave His one and only Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish but have eternal life" John 3:16.*

Counterfeit Christmas

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ounterfeit is inevitable. Isn't it? In fact, the more valuable an entity, perhaps the more susceptible it is to be counterfeited! Every genuine product has a counterfeit, and that is the reason we have state protection laws of sorts, including intellectual property rights, etc, in order to check counterfeits. On one hand, a counterfeit is something or someone not genuine. It is unreal, imitation, or forged. It is made or copied to resemble close to the original; if not, make it identical! Counterfeiting, in its essence, is not simply imitating, but at its core, is to deceive people. Counterfeit products are often lower quality than the real thing, and even dangerous. Counterfeit food, drink, and medicines can easily kill people. On the other hand, authentic, genuine, real, etc., comes to mind when we think of something of original value, original products, original services, etc. Original products may, at times, be defective, but this does not deter people from preferring original products.

The post-modern philosophical agenda has succeeded in areas such as questioning and deconstructing even the basic tenets of life and truths. And so, the shifting of the objective reality to subjective interpretation has its impact on the way people look at - gender, family, relationships, life, church, and the Truth itself. So then, the question is: are we more or less confused with this newfound relativist perspective of life? Like it or not, we also live in a time of "quick-fixes", "one-time-useand-throw," and "at-a -push-of-a-button" generation. Lately, the mantra to success, especially in the post-COVID reality, is "DIY - Do It Yourself" and match that with ever-increasing, much sought-after 'Self-help books' (and Gurus). Adding on such a phenomenon of focusing on oneself with an insatiable thirst for newer, cheaper, faster, bigger things the market can provide is, to me, a perfect receipt and compelling environment to fake and counterfeit anything under the sun.

Besides the material counterfeits, I wonder whether we have counterfeit ideas and people amidst us. Possible? I believe philosophies, religion, and god—Jesus Christ are all the more counterfeitable, given their popularity and glamour. What about the age-old, century-after-century claims made by scores of personalities to be Jesus Christ reincarnate; from Rhys Evans in the 17th century to Alan John Miller in the 21st century? In fact, 2 Corinthians 11:14 says, "and no wonder, for Satan himself, masquerades as an angel of light!". What do these scenarios leave us with?

Should all these be a fraction of the counterfeit possibilities surrounding us? How often have we tried to examine Christmas, which we celebrate with much passion and fervor, evidently weeks before (Advents) the event? How original is the Christmas content in our celebration today? John 8:31-32 says, "to the Jews who had believed him, Jesus said, if you hold to my teaching, you are really my disciples. Then you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free." Hence, how true is our Christmas today?

Britannica describes Christmas as a ... "Christian festival celebrating the birth of Jesus. The English term *Christmas* ("mass on Christ's day") is of fairly recent origin. The corresponding terms in other languages are *Navidad* in Spanish, *Natale* in Italian, *Noel* in French–all probably denote "nativity" etc. However, not getting into the

nitty-gritty of Christmas Day, let us focus on the essence of Christmas and examine how close we are to the purpose and content of Christmas. It is indeed the birth of God's only Son – Jesus Christ, who came to give love, joy, hope, and peace. The Bible says that humans were separated from God because of sin, and there was no way but to have a saviour who would take on the penalty of sin. This coming of the one and only saviour God in the form of Jesus Christ to be born on earth as a man, live, die, and rise again to reconcile man back to God is the one and only significance of Christmas. Therefore, on a day such as Christmas Day, how do we as individuals, families, churches, and the Christian communities observe this supernatural event?

Against the backdrop of these considerations, let us examine three (3) contextual realities beneath the superficiality of Christmas Celebrations in our homes and churches in Nagaland:

1.Consumerism

Beneath the frenzy of shopping and pompous decorations is a sad reality of our Naga society: We are a poverty-stricken society. I had an acquaintance with a young administrator in Dimapur from mainland India who confided (for fear of being impolite) in me that Naga society is an extremely impoverished state. However, one has to look beyond the outer lustre to see this reality. According to him, a majority of government employees are living hand-to-mouth with no additional source of income for the family. Most families live with no safety nets financially. Deeply sucked into consumerism and all outward display. Hence, an apparently stable family is easily destabilized by just a small emergency or crisis in a family. Yes, some may still argue that it is okay to splurge once in a while -Christmas! However, splurging with all that one has is counterproductive. Still, some could argue that Nagas are a communitarian society and do not mind generous gifting and donating. But then, if we look at Associations and churches today, it is entrenched in flaunting records or gifting. So then, the very rationale behind any form of giving is at stack with such practices in the society. Or is it not so? Counterfeit Christmas is, in a way, lavishing on facades that really do not matter. So then, a counterfeit test is: Are you giving meaningful gifts or just buying things to meet expectations?

2. Tradition

Tradition is an indispensable part of society. Sociologists would say that it is the vehicle on which human civilization travels. Tradition is what keeps a society alive and strong if founded on age-old values and principles. Christmas, for that matter, is a wonderful tradition for the Christian community to commemorate the birth of Jesus Christ. However, the

commercialization of Christmas has taken over the essence of tradition today. Santa Claus's visit, competitive exotic gifts - treats, Christmas tree lighting, sights of decorated reindeer sleigh, stars and cakes of all shapes and sizes, the unending slaughter of pigs, and good flow of liquor etc seem to have taken over most excitements in a 'christmas gathering'. Habit to a person is what tradition is to a society. It's the habits that make or break a person, so also, a tradition, if not appropriated rightly, will cause societal chaos. In line with what Socrates said, that "an unexamined life is not worth living", traditions also need to be examined, as it has a conditioning effect on both young and old. In order to escape the attack of the counterfeit Christmas, Christians (churches) ought to first critically examine the ageold traditions and align every step with the word of the living God. Any form of superficiality and blinded adherence to traditions should be questioned and rectified. This can begin from the outwardnesses down to the core of biblical teaching on the divinity and the humanity of Jesus at Christmas. Isaiah 9:6 says for to us a child is born, to us a son is given, and the government will be on his shoulders. And he will be called Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace. So then, a counterfeit test is: are you seeking real peace or just avoiding conflict for the sake of convenience and tradition?

3.Busybodies

A person who meddles in the affairs of others is called a busybody, which is in contrast to a person busy at work (minding his/her business). All echelons of Naga society seem to come alive during Christmas—sometimes using year-end as a bonus excuse, but mostly in the name of Christmas fellowships.

With bigger-the-better social events and hand-picked-people parties in the name of Christmas, a normal Christian family in Nagaland is literally tattered between church - neighborhood association - family, and friend. It is worth examining whether relationships take deeper roots through such gatherings or if one is caught up unaware in the unceasing honors of hostguest syndrome. Being fiercely busy is sometimes good, but in the midst of such busyness, if the essence of Christmas is lost, then a default counterfeit Christmas comes into play in all such social gatherings. Matt 7:21-23 says, 'not everyone who says to me, 'Lord, Lord,' will enter the kingdom of heaven, but only the one who does the will of my Father who is in heaven. Many will say to me on that day, 'Lord, Lord, did we not prophesy in your name and in your name drive out demons and in your name perform many miracles?' Then I will tell them plainly, 'I never knew you. Away from me, you evildoers!' Then again, a counterfeit test: Are you showing true love or merely fulfilling social norms and personal desires as a busybody?

In order to escape Counterfeit Christmas, Christmas time ought to be spent as a reminder to reflect on the authenticity of our relationships with man and God and focus on the true meaning and values Christmas brings. This thought should help us go beyond the surface level and pursue genuine love and peace through introspection and understanding of one's own condition without Christ (Christmas). It's a call to rediscover the true meaning of the season-whether through spiritual reflection, loving-kindness, generosity, or simply taking the time to connect with those who matter to us and who need us the most. This analogy of Counterfeit Christmas invites us to reflect on our own relationship(s) and Christmas celebrations. Are we truly embracing the values behind these important aspects of life, or are we merely going through the motions and relying on superficial expressions that leave us feeling empty? The antidote is to strive for authenticity in love, in Christmas, and in every aspect of our lives. Only by seeking the real thing can we experience the contentment and joy that Christmas is meant to bring. Genuine affection, love, and sacrifices among men ought not to be reduced to mere gestures or obligations.

Looking back at Christmas' celebrated in my life, one that stands tall is my first experience of visiting a terminally ill hospice in Mumbai with a few church friends. The tradition was to sing carols for them as tenderly as we could since some of them were indeed very feeble. Few inmates showed interest, few were indifferent, but some had a strange look on their faces. Perhaps, the songs were never heard of! That day, I was not sure whether any souls were blessed through the carols we sang, but for me, a life-transforming thought went through my mind. A closer look at the reality of dying. The futile reality of life and the fate we are all destined to meet sooner or later. What a meaningful Christmas I had and what sheer gratitude to have health and life. Indeed, even life forevermore- all because of Christmas. It is said that, specifically, trained people who look for counterfeit money do not keep checking for fake money. They perhaps cannot find all the fake stuff out there. Instead, they study the real money so well so that when they encounter counterfeit money, they automatically spot it right on. They know that it's a fake because they recognize the real thing very well. We cannot possibly study all sorts of counterfeit Christmas celebrations. Perhaps only our moment-by-moment, day-to-day walk, that experiential knowledge about Jesus Christ, will help us recognize the counterfeit Christmas. Jesus was comfortable with people from all socio-economic and cultural walks of life - all social outcasts - thieves, prostitutes, liars, learned/illiterate, rich/ poor, but Jesus could not stand the hypocrites – the Pharisees and Sadducees - the counterfeits. May we all be blessed to be comfortable with Jesus this Christmas.

6 Reasons Why Corporate Prayer is Powerful and Essential

hroughout church history, God's people have gathered for corporate prayer. In fact, many of the greatest revivals started as believers joined together in community prayer meetings. In the early church, believers met often – sometimes daily – for prayer and worship.

In our present culture of busyness, we have lost a bit of the urgency of corporate prayer meetings.

What exactly is corporate prayer? Corporate prayer is simply the church praying together as one. As the leader suggests various topics, the participants pray together for those suggested topics. When we gather together and combine our prayers as one body of Christ the results are powerful.

What does the bible teach about corporate prayer?

"For where two or three gather in my name, there am I with them" (Matthew 18:20). In the book of Acts, we see the early church gathering regularly for the purpose of prayer (Acts 2:40-47). At times they gathered daily. As they faithfully prayed, God came among them and worked mighty miracles in response to their faithfulness. Corporate prayer was foundational and a core value of the early church.

What Does Corporate Prayer Do?

1. Corporate Prayer Unifies the Body of Christ

Corporate prayer connects us around a common purpose; seeking God's heart. As we seek Him together there is solidarity. We're not all pulling in our own direction. Our prayers become less selfish and more focused on God's will and purpose for our lives and the lives of others.

2. Corporate Prayer Edifies and Encourages Those Who Participate

When we gather together to pray and seek the heart of God, individual hearts are encouraged. Life is hard and our difficulties are many. Individuals within the group may be struggling with trials too personal to mention but as they pray in unity with other believers, their hearts are re-focused on almighty God. Their faith is strengthened by remembering His grace and goodness. The Holy Spirit brings them reassurance and comfort through the prayers of others. This is why the wise writer of Hebrews reminds us to not forsake meeting together (Hebrews 10:25).

3. Corporate Prayer Disciples Believers in Prayer

As believers gather together for prayer, those who are newbies to the faith are able to learn from those who are mature in their faith. As those who are new to the faith listen to others praying, they will learn prayer techniques such as praying Scripture, listening in silence for God's response, interceding on behalf of others, and methods of praising and worshipping God. In essence, they will be discipled in prayer.

4. Corporate Prayer Strengthens Weakened Faith

When our faith is fragile and doubt is creeping in, corporate prayer and worship can strengthen us as we lean into the faith of others. Often when prayers go seemingly unanswered for a long time, doubt creeps in. When we pray with other believers and experience God moving it strengthens our hearts to wait on Him for our own answers. Surrounding ourselves with strong prayer warriors strengthens our faith and even brings healing.

5. Corporate Prayer Can Facilitate Corporate Repentance

Ezra, Nehemiah, and Daniel all modeled repentance as part of corporate prayer (Ezra 7:10, Nehemiah 9:2, Daniel 9:11). When we engage in corporate confession, each of us as individuals are cleansed and forgiven for our sins and there is a fresh awakening to the power and presence of the Holy Spirit. As a result, often revival is unleashed.

6. Corporate Prayer Creates a Sense of Expectancy

Expectancy is a Biblical concept. In Psalm 5, David wrote, "In the morning, LORD, you hear my voice; in the morning I lay my requests before you and wait expectantly" (Psalm 5:3).

As believers continue to regularly gather for intentional times of corporate prayer a sense of anticipation arises. People become excited to have these prayer meetings, expecting to see God show up and answer. As folks witness God answering the prayers of others, their sense of hope builds and they wait

with expectation for God to answer their own requests. A unified Biblical mindset of faith develops.

Tending to Future Fruit: Reflections from Working with Youth

s I reflect on my journey with the youth, I am reminded of the diverse motivations that drive individuals to seek God. In this article, I'd like to share my observations and insights, highlighting three distinct groups of seekers.



THE RELUCTANT SEEKERS

We encounter young people who attend church services begrudgingly, often due to external pressures from parents, guardians, or hostel rules. They may enter unprepared, ungroomed, and late, preferring to sit at the back and slip out unnoticed after the service. Their hearts seem far from genuinely seeking God.

However, I've witnessed remarkable transformations within this group. Some have surrendered their lives to Christ, testifying that initial reluctance gave way to a deepening faith. One youth shared, "I initially attended church because of hostel rules, but through the messages and fellowship, I began to seek God genuinely." Another testified, "I was reluctant at first, but the Word of God spoke directly to my heart, and now I eagerly look forward to services."

This reminds us that God's sovereignty knows no bounds. Matthew 15:7-10 cautions us against superficial faith: "You hypocrites! ... These people honor me with their lips, but their hearts are far from me. They worship me in vain; their teachings are merely human rules." Jesus quotes Isaiah 29:13, emphasizing the importance of genuine devotion.

Il Corinthians 9:7 encourages willing generosity, not compulsion: "Each of you should give what you have decided in your heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver." Let us ponder our motivations and ensure our hearts are fully engaged in our worship.

THE PERSONAL SEEKERS

A second group of youths attends church with a deep sense of longing. They recognize something is missing in their lives and seek answers to life's profound questions. Psalm 34:4 illustrates God's deliverance: "I sought the Lord, and he answered me; he delivered me from all my fears."

The story of the Samaritan woman (John 4:1-42) exemplifies genuine seekers going beyond surface-level faith. Jesus' encounter with her reveals the depth of God's knowledge and love. This woman's and the Samaritan people's transformation (v. 40-42) inspires us to look beyond mere attendance and seek a personal, life-changing relationship with Christ.

Our connection with God involves:

- Personal experiences of His presence and guidance
- Meditation on His Word
- Prayer, seeking His will and wisdom
- Community, growing alongside fellow believers

Many young people come to church because they are thirsty and seeking answers. I remember a youth sharing, "I was struggling with anxiety, but through prayer and fellowship, I found peace." Another testified, "I sought God's guidance for my career, and He showed me a clear path." The Personal Seekers go beyond church gatherings, beneficial podcasts, and motivational speeches because they are genuinely hungry for a deeper connection with God. They:

- Attend Bible studies and small groups
- Participate in prayer meetings
- Seek mentorship from spiritual leaders
- Engage in personal devotions and reflection

Psalm 42:1-2 expresses the longing of the Personal Seekers: "As the deer pants for streams of water, so my soul pants for you, O God. My soul thirsts for God, for the living God." May we cultivate this depth of desire in our pursuit of God.

THE CONCERNED SEEKERS

The largest and most encouraging group consists of young people who demonstrate selflessness and concern for others. They pray for their loved ones' spiritual lives, often seeking guidance and support. Epaphras's example inspires us (Colossians 1:7, 4:12-13):

- Faithful servant and fellow prisoner
- Hardworking and passionate intercessor

We have Epaphras in our midst today, who intercede for their loved ones, demonstrating the selfless nature that comes from God. I recall a youth sharing, "I pray for my parents' spiritual growth, that they may know Christ personally." Another testified, "I was moved to pray for my siblings after experiencing God's love."

My father's testimony also resonates with me. He shared in one of the services at my local church, "I regret wasting years living my life my own way, failing as a father. But now, I urge

fellow parents, especially fathers, not to live a life of regret. Let us set good examples for our children, that they may follow Christ." His words remind us that it's never too late to make amends and start anew.

As parents, guardians, and elders, we must set good examples for these young seekers. Luke 15:20-24 assures us of God's compassion and second chances. The parable of the prodigal son reminds us that it's never too late to return to our Heavenly Father. AS WE NURTURE OUR YOUTH, LET'S REMEMBER THAT OUR CHILDREN ARE OUR ETERNAL HERITAGE (MARK 8:36)

As we nurture our youth, let's remember that our children are our eternal heritage (Mark 8:36): "For what will it profit a man, if he gains the whole world, and forfeit his soul?" The concerned seekers give us hope for a brighter future.

Let us continue striving for eternal goals, investing in the next generation, and trusting God to bring forth a bountiful harvest.

Aday in the life: Mr. Buruga Vijaya Sridhar

1. How was the journey that led you to become manager of OM Books, Dimapur?

> When I joined OM Evangelical team along with the outreach ministry we also had a small bookstore at my home town in Vijayawada. After sometime our head office main branch bookshop which is at Logos Bhavan was organising 'book fair' or 'book exhibition' quite regularly. During that time I got the opportunity to help within Andhra Pradesh. That's how and slowly my journey begun with the literature ministry of OM India. A month later and with the support of OM AP leadership I got the opportunity to join as 'a job' as an assistant manager at our OM Head Office in Secunderabad. But this was for training time of one year and after that I was supposed to go to another state. I gave commitment to do literature ministry anywhere in India. After few months our Director of 'Retail Department' called and asked me to come to North East part of India which I took up with prayer and after much talks with my family. I came along with some carpenters in the 1st week of January 2004. We started book shop works (arranging furniture and stock arrangements.) And on 1st March, 2004 OM Books Dimapur branch was dedicated by Rev. L. Kari Longchar. This is how was my humble journey from south part of India to North East India began.





2. What does a typical working day in your life look like?

> A typical day involves a mix of administrative and operational tasks. Arranging stock, checking the inventory, ordering the new and old titles and Bibles from our Head Office, giving information to the customers and to the social media, planning for book exhibitions and doing all the practical arrangements and needed publicity for the exhibitions that are planned / scheduled. A significant part of the day goes with my team to strategize on improving the book shop outreach and ensuring we meet our set targets / goals.

3. What is the most rewarding aspect of your line of work?

> The most rewarding aspect is seeing lives being touched and transformed by the books that we sell / distribute. Hearing some testimonies of how a particular book encouraged someone during a tough time or brought them closer to God fills my heart with joy and it reminds me that this work is a part of a greater mission to share God's love and trust. The relationships we (OM Books) built with the local churches and organizations over the years are also incredibly rewarding. Praise God for the continued partnership that OM has with all our people here and surrounding places.

4. What are some challenges you face at work?

> Challenges often reminds me to rely on God for wisdom and patience. Whether it's managing the demands of the business, competing with modern trends or addressing customer's needs, I have learned to see these challenges as opportunity to grow and trust in God's provision. I believe that every difficulty is a chance to strengthen our faith and live creatively in serving others better. Since Nagaland has many Bible colleges, schools and short-term study centres, we want to make sure that we do our best for fulfilling their requirements and having books / titles that are made available, which is quite challenging.

In fact memories like these reinforce the importance of what we do. And but for the past twenty years serving to the Naga churches is a great memory for me (and my family) and my team here at the Dimapur bookshop.


6. What are your favorite books in the book shop?

Counterculture: Following Christ in an anti-Christian age

ounterculture applies to a group of people who oppose mainstream values and norms, and instead embrace unconventional lifestyles and ideologies. Here, I would like to point out that every age has been "anti-Christian" in some sense. Even lesus said

been "anti-Christian" in some sense. Even Jesus said in John 15:20 that '...If they have persecuted me, they will also persecute you...'

It will be more appropriate for Christians of the present age to understand the culture in which we live and find ways to present the unchanging message of Christ in a way that is relevant and relatable.

To follow Christ means to be a Christian literally. And doing so has been unchanged and is as simple a step as when Jesus showed it Himself. He being the first fruit, our work is to follow His lead. The problem arises when we, as finite beings living in a time and place, carry our cultural baggage along which obscure the truth sometimes.

Until the new earth (*Rev 21:1*) is revealed, this present earth will always be under satan (*2 Cor 4:4*). This is the reason why we as a Christian should always be in a war footing (Acts 13:1-13). The enemy's goal is to steal, destroy and kill (*John 10:10, "The thief cometh not, but for to steal, and to kill, and to destroy"*).

Considering that we live in a fallen world, one which is ruled by the devil whose goal is to destroy us, we may sometimes ask as a Christian if we are allowed or even have to be involved with the 'fallen world'. The straight answer to this is an absolute yes. Christians are supposed to engage and address societal issues. We are to actively promote our views and spread the gospel and not just be a mere observer. (Matthew 28:19 'Go ye therefore, and **teach** all nations, **baptizing** them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost')

Coming to the context of Nagaland and India, I see few challenges that hamper in presenting and living out the gospel.



 Syncretism: With traditional beliefs being mixed and confused with Christianity. Although Christianity has penerated all aspects of Naga life, still the old belief has not completely disappeared and sometimes manifests itself in the form of spiritualism, the mushrooming of prayer centres and faith healings.

No doubt we battle with powers and principalities, not just physical observable things (*Eph 6:12*) but then we should not bend Christianity in a distorted way in order to accommodate our traditions.

Although understandable but in an attempt to remain relevant and attractive in a fast changing world many a time we as Christians imitate the patterns and modalities of the society at large. We should be contemporary but not be 'the world' to 'save the world.' Only when we become the image of God and not the image of Adam will we be able to be the salt and light of the world.

 Post-modernism: The influence of postmodern thinking has reached our land also. The youth no longer believe in anything absolute. They are encouraged to question everything and not be confined by any laws because everyone has their own reality. One's own feelings are more important than the truth because there is no absolute truth anymore. This can Only when we become the image of God and not the image of Adam will we be able to be the salt and light of the world.

be seen from the kind of music and songs that the youth plays and listen to these days. Even gospel songs reflect the same thought process. They are more about reflections on oneself rather than God Himself.

How the 'self' is given more importance can be seen even in relationships. Many couples think more about one's comfort and feelings and blame the other for not understanding him/her. Today with the influence of postmodernism, many ridicule Christianity as intolerant, egotistical, and arrogant because of our exclusive claims about God and morality.

Paul reminds us in *Romans 12:2, "not to be conformed to this world: but be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind, that ye may prove what is that good, and acceptable, and perfect, will of God."*

3. Influence of social media: In a world of social media and influencers, most people especially the youth, want to be noticed, accepted, and admired, which many a time lead them to be loud and have a defiant behaviour. This can often lead to social disorder. There is hardly respect for the elderly or the weak. Many people live in a cocoon and a sheltered life without being able to empathize with people who are more disadvantageous.

A good principle of social media is given in *1 Corinthians 10:31*, *'Whether therefore ye eat, or drink, or whatsoever ye do, do all to the glory of God'*. Social media is a double edged sword. It can have its ill effects but surely can be used for good.

- 4. One of the great misconceptions among many Naga Christian is 'Work for salvation'. We are saved by grace and not by work. Our good works do not earn us salvation but rather good works are an outcome of being saved. By offering our tainted and corrupt money to God, we do not wash away our sins (Romans 11:6).
- 5. There has been a concrete effort by the majority Hindu in India to appropriate indigenous culture into itself. On one side there is increasing hatred, discrimination and prejudice against Christians and Christian organisations but on the other hand there is a false narrative being promoted that the tribal culture was and is part of greater Hindu culture. These indigenous tribal religion and practices are being absorbed into Hinduism eg: Heraka and Dony polo - promoted by Hindutva organisations.

Many Christians live in fear in many parts of India. The governmental machinery is used to harass and wrongly accuse Christian and Christian institutes.

eg: 1. Foreign Contribution (Regulation) Act (FRCA) used to close down World Vision in India.

2. Assam Magical Healing (Prevention of Evil Practices) Act, 2024.

We live in a secular country with a religious population, so as a Christian we should be sensitive to others but also stand for the truth (John 8:32). We should make our voices and opinions be heard instead of just being a passive observer.

Coming to a conclusion, we may say that living a Christian life is a counterculture in many senses. On the other hand, God's love for us is strong and powerful enough for us to maintain our loyalty and not be tempted by the norms of mainstream society. Christians should be a part of this world and society but stay true to the gospel of Christ Jesus. This I believe will allow us to stay relevant to the different cultural norms while also staying true to Christianity counter-culture core.

ften, it is little things in life that make a difference. Little Bible stories, little memory verses, little conversations, little prayers, little recreations, little hugs and little children that may appear insignificant. It is, but imperative to view beyond the littleness. As we strive to nurture, appreciate and commit to train children, these little acts help yield a great harvest.

CBCD Sunday School maintained the World Sunday School Day theme selected by All India Sunday School Association [AISSA] '*Little Seeds, Big Harvest*' on November 3rd 2024. Confliction to Conviction Exploring Faith and Science

he relationship between faith and science has often been perceived as a battleground, where belief in the divine is pitted against empirical scientific inquiry. For many Christians, such as me, working as a geologist, this conflict has oftentimes manifested as an internal struggle, leading me to question my beliefs in the light of any scientific knowledge I have come to

learn thus far. I want to try to draw some few examples from my subject where some stark conflicts are observable and debated and I will not intend to discuss science in any way whatsoever. This article is somewhat of a testimony, a personal indulgence to share my journey from a personal confliction with established sciences to my conviction in my faith in our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ. I intend to illustrate how faith in Jesus Christ can and should coexist with a scientific worldview, and how our conviction in our risen Lord, should overcome any confliction that can and will arise while working in various fields, not necessarily exclusive to science, but in every field of study.

The Initial Conflict

At the heart of the conflict between my faith and the subject I chose to study, lie the differing methods of understanding reality. Science relies on observation, experimentation, and reproducibility of scientific experiments. On the other hand, faith is often correlated with, and embraces the unseen and the spiritual side. For many Christians, the rise of scientific theories – particularly those regarding evolution, the origins of the universe, the big bang theory and the age of the Earth, can trigger doubts about biblical narratives. When I was a student pursuing my Master's Degree in Applied Geology at IIT Bombay, I came across many brilliant professors and students from the departments of Earth Science, Mathematics, Computer



Science and Physics and during the course of my interactions with them, we discussed about our faith and religion. Many of them were atheists or agnostics, and scoffed at the very idea of a Christian God. None of them were rude to me, every one of them still remain good friends of mine but me back then, in a very infant stage of faith, had very little input or opinion in those discussions about how we can believe

in a Creator God when everything seemed to be provable by science; and many times, I really doubted my own faith. They would suggest to me that if I really was a student of science, how could I believe in an Almighty God who created everything and how could I pray to that God and expect Him to answer my prayers.

In Geology, the age of rocks and minerals bear immense importance as we use it as a guide to search for mineral deposits and to understand how our planet was formed. While renowned Christian apologists such as Prof. John Lennox, make statements such as, "What does the Bible say about the age of the Earth? Nothing! Absolutely nothing! Full stop!", the age of the Earth does matter for geologists as it has far reaching consequences in our attempts to explain how and when our planet was created and where exactly to search for valuable mineral deposits. Many scientists get a good laugh when they hear about Noah's Flood but what they do not realize is how they cannot explain occurrences such as polystrate fossils, (fossilized tree trunks cutting across multiple sedimentary layers), or, how they cannot explain the folding, faulting or any form of deformation occurs within any rock layer, and those topics are conveniently ignored to this day.

We Geologists have this fancy approach to every rock formation based on a phrase "The present is the key to the past",

also known as the principle of uniformitarianism, popularized by Scottish Geologist Sir Charles Lyll in 1833. Therefore, our minds are hard-wired to deduce all present observations and relate them to past events, and that dinosaurs went extinct 65 million years ago. But, ironically, with the discovery that many dinosaur bones still contain soft tissue, the whole scientific base has been shaken to its core. In that sense, we just might have gotten the age of the earth wrong! Here, it is relevant to remember that the whole concept of time is man-made (2 Peter 3:8).

As students of science, if not careful, one can start to grapple with such conflicting ideologies between what is readily, scientifically provable and what requires faith to concede to what is not provable (2 Corinthians 5:7) and feelings of anxiety and uncertainty often emerge, and they do lead to many conflicting thoughts; thoughts that may lead one to live a life as they wish, with no consequences or judgment at the end, whatsoever. The perceived dichotomy can lead to a crisis of faith, where believers feel compelled to choose between their spiritual beliefs and the scientific explanations of the world around them. This phase of conflict can be deeply unsettling, as it was for me, and challenges the foundational aspects of one's identity and beliefs. But now I realise, that need not be the case.

So, my conflicts were these: (i) It seemed a lot easier to believe in science with all the repeatable experiments and proofs, than to believe in an invisible, inaudible God (ii) How could I ever know that there is a life after death? Because, just as I have no memory before birth, I may have no memory after death. (iii) What if all the religious construct was a way to comfort the weak, the sick, the poor, of an eternal reward after death? (iv) What if the age of the Earth is not 6000 years as the Bible suggest, but it is actually 4,500,000,000 years as science has established based on experiments done on rocks?

The Journey to Reconciliation

Regardless, I had a desire for deeper understanding of faith because I was never confident with my own understandings, and I always knew there has to be more. Comically, I realized that struggling with faith is the surest sign of having faith regardless of how misplaced or weak it was. Tim Keller said, "Weak faith in a strong object is infinitely better than strong faith in a weak object". Many Christians embark on this path by engaging with both science and theology. While I have no understanding in the subject of Theology or, as mentioned earlier, for that matter, Geology, I know there is a greater force and power beyond science. A very wise Pastor, with whom I have consulted with while writing this article, after patiently listening to my ramblings told me, "Do not let your work overshadow your faith.", which I agree and will live by for the rest of my life.

A crucial step in this reconciliation for me personally, was the recognition that science and faith answer different questions. Science seeks to explain how the universe works, providing insights into physical processes and natural laws answering the 'what' and the 'when' aspects of the questions. In contrast, faith addresses the "why" of existence, offering a narrative of purpose, morality, and relationship with the divine Creator, God and how God created the infinite, incomprehensible universe, and I choose to go with my faith in God. This distinction allows me to appreciate the contributions of both realms without feeling compelled to dismiss one in favour of the other.

Embracing a Holistic Faith

As I moved through my personal conflicts, I discovered a more profound faith that embraced complexity. This faith recognizes that God's creation is intricate and that science can only so much as reveal the beauty of that creation. The "awe inspired" scientific discoveries - whether the vastness of the universe or the complexity of cellular processes, can and should deepen one's appreciation of a Creator.

A holistic faith, so to speak, also acknowledges the limitations of human understanding. The Bible encourages believers to have faith in the midst of uncertainty, reminding us that not all questions can be answered, nor should be answered at all. In Hebrews 11:1, faith is defined as "the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction/assurance of things not seen." This perspective allowed me to embrace scientific findings without feeling threatened, viewing them as part of God's ongoing revelation.

The Bible encourages believers to have faith in the midst of uncertainty, reminding us that not all questions can be answered, nor should be answered at all.

From Conviction to Action

Ultimately, the journey from conflict to conviction empowered me to live out my faith in unexpected transformative ways. When faith and science are no longer seen as adversaries, we can engage with the world more fully. Christians are called to be stewards of creation, and an informed faith can drive meaningful action in these areas. Furthermore, I think, this reconciliation fosters a sense of community among believers and scientists alike. For example, in one of the papers I am currently working on, me and my team are discovering, for the first time, that the sand grains of the rocks at Mt. Saramati, the highest peak in Nagaland, is sourced from the Australian continent and it is roughly 450,000,000 years old. But now I am convinced that even if we do publish our work, none of the finer details will matter except my conviction that God is the Creator and that our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ is the only way to God the Father, and that conviction should convict me that there shouldn't have been a confliction in my faith in the first place.

I personally believe that there can be no greater evidence of God's love for us than Him sending His Son Jesus to die for us, but two other evidences of His love for us stands out to me: (i) Him creating us in His image, the only reason why we can think, create the most beautiful art, compose the sweetest music, make the most advanced scientific discoveries, the ability to feel all emotions and (ii) Giving us free-will, just so we don't turn into robots, that we are given the gift and freedom to choose, and decide, to the extent of questioning His existence.

Conclusion

This journey of mine from "Confliction" to "Conviction", was not just a personal struggle. I now realize, it was God who was behind this and He knew how best to lead me to Him. By embracing the complexities of both realms, I found a faith that is robust, informed, and deeply connected to the realities of this world. This journey, I believe, led me to a deeper reverence of God and His creations and also to a richer and more fulfilling life of faith, while realizing that man-made time scales, scientific principles, while it may matter here on Earth, will count for nothing without a conviction to live my life for Christ.

Georges Lemaître, the Belgian astronomer and cosmologist who developed the Big Bang theory, had a number of quotes about religion and science, one of my favourite and most notable quotes was this: "Once you realize that the Bible does not purport to be a textbook of science, the old controversy between religion and science vanishes"

To finally conclude, my experience with the conflict between science and my faith began as I studied science, but,

ironically and wonderfully, it was science which led me to my conviction of God's existence (first conviction) and ultimately my conviction that Jesus Christ is THE only way, the truth and the life (John 14:6), and that none of us can ever remotely hope to come to God except through Him (second conviction). Regardless of it all, there lies the issue of me not reading God's Word closely enough to avoid these conflicts in the first place, when verses such as Isaiah 55:8-9 and Job 38:3-41 should make me shudder to even have the audacity to have such conflicts.

Therefore, in my case, I'd like to think that the final imaginary equation goes something like this:

"Confliction = Conviction²". Hence, proved.

Prophet Haggai played a crucial role during this period. He delivered his prophecies in 520 BC, about 18 years after the first return.

Haggai's main message was to urge the people to prioritize rebuilding the Temple, which had been neglected due to opposition and discouragement. His prophecies were direct and timely, encouraging the Israelites to refocus on their spiritual duties and the importance of the Temple in their community.

Haggai's influence was significant because the people listened to his message and resumed the construction of the Temple, which was completed in 516 BC. His work, alongside other leaders like Zerubbabel and Joshua the high priest, helped restore the religious and communal life of the Israelites after their return from exile.

Ezra 5:1-2 Then the prophet Haggai and Zechariah the son of Iddo, prophets, prophesied to the Jews who were in Judah and Jerusalem, in the name of the God of Israel, who was over them. So Zerubbabel the son of Shealtiel and Jeshua the son of Jozadak rose up and began to build the house of God which is in Jerusalem; and the prophets of God were with them, helping them.

Ezra chapter 6:1-18

First Return (538 BC): Led by Zerubbabel, this group focused on

rebuilding the Temple in Jerusalem.

Second Return (458 BC): Led by Ezra, this wave emphasized spiritual and religious reforms.

Third Return (445 BC): Led by Nehemiah, this group concentrated on rebuilding Jerusalem's walls.

The second year of Darius - sixth month - the first day of the month (1:1).

The Twenty-fourth Day of the month (1:15).

Seventh month – The Twenty-first Day of the month (2:1).

Ninth month – The Twenty-fourth Day of the month (2:10; 18; 20).

I. THE COMMAND OF GOD – Haggai 1:1-11

The second year of Darius - sixth month - the first day of the month (1:1)

The three roles in the church

The prophet, priest and the prince – All of us have all these roles – **I Peter 2:9**, " But you are a chosen generation, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, His own special people, that you may proclaim the praises of Him who called you out of darkness into His marvellous light".

<u>Consider your ways – 1:1-5</u>

Haggai 1:4-5, "Is it time for you yourselves to dwell in your panelled houses, and this temple to lie in ruins?" Now therefore, thus says the LORD of hosts: "Consider your ways!"

They came back from exile in 538 BC. The prophecies of

Haggai began in 520 BC, 18 years after their return. They had forgotten why they had come back to Jerusalem. Yes, there was opposition and discouragement but the fact that they were living in panelled houses shows that they have become inwardlooking and thinking only for their own comfort and well-being.

Does this not apply to us?

We have forgotten to a large extent why we are church – John 17:15-18 (Reconciliation)

Haggai 1:8 "Go up to the mountains and bring wood and build the temple, that I may take pleasure in it and be glorified," says the LORD.

Hard work & church community pleases God. It glorifies God.

Isaiah 56:7 "Even them I will bring to My holy mountain, And make them joyful in My house of prayer. Their burnt offerings and their sacrifices Will be accepted on My altar; For My house shall be called a house of prayer for all nations." (Ref. Isaiah 2:1-5)

Drought on the land

Hagai 1:9-11 "You looked for much, but indeed it came to little; and when you brought it home, I blew it away. Why?" says the LORD of hosts. "Because of My house that is in ruins, while every one of you runs to his own house. Therefore the heavens above you withhold the dew, and the earth withholds its fruit. For I called for a drought on the land and the mountains, on the grain and the new wine and the oil, on whatever the ground brings forth, on men and livestock, and on all the labour of your hands."

II. OBEDIENCE - Haggai 1:12-15

The second year of Darius – sixth month – The Twenty-fourth Day of the month (1:15)

Haggai 1:12, "Then Zerubbabel the son of Shealtiel, and Joshua the son of Jehozadak, the high priest, with all the remnant of the people, <u>obeyed the voice of the LORD their God</u>, and the words of Haggai the prophet, as the LORD their God had sent him; and <u>the people feared the presence of the LORD</u>."

I Peter 2:6-8, "Therefore it is also contained in the Scripture, "BEHOLD, I LAY IN ZION A CHIEF CORNERSTONE, ELECT, PRECIOUS, AND HE WHO BELIEVES ON HIM WILL BY NO MEANS BE PUT TO SHAME." Therefore, to you who believe, *He is* precious; but to those who are disobedient, "THE STONE WHICH THE BUILDERS REJECTED HAS BECOME THE CHIEF CORNERSTONE," and "A STONE OF STUMBLING AND A ROCK OF OFFENSE." <u>They</u> stumble, being disobedient to the word, to which they also were

<u>appointed</u>."

The Israelites obeyed the voice of the Lord ;they feared the presence of the Lord which indicated that they were coming back to reconciliation; they were coming back to Shalom.

Haggai 1:13, "Then Haggai, the LORD's messenger, spoke the LORD's message to the people, saying, <u>"I am with you, says the LORD."</u>

Acts 17:28, "for in Him we live and move and have our being, as also some of your own poets have said, 'For we are also His offspring."

Haggai 1:14, "So the LORD stirred up the spirit of Zerubbabel the son of Shealtiel, governor of Judah, and the spirit of Joshua the son of Jehozadak, the high priest, and the spirit of all the remnant of the people; and they came and worked on the house of the LORD of hosts, their God."

John 7:37-39, "On the last day, that great *day* of the feast, Jesus stood and cried out, saying, "If anyone thirsts, let him come to Me and drink. He who believes in Me, as the Scripture has said, out of his heart will flow rivers of living water." But this He spoke concerning the Spirit, whom those believing in Him would receive; for the Holy Spirit was not yet *given*, because Jesus was not yet glorified.

2 Cor 3:17, "Now the Lord is the Spirit; and where the Spirit of the Lord *is*, there *is* liberty."

III. GOD'S GLORY - Haggai 2:1-9

The second year of Darius - Seventh month - The Twenty-first Day of the month (2:1)

Haggai 2:2-3 "Speak now to Zerubbabel the son of Shealtiel, governor of Judah, and to Joshua the son of Jehozadak, the high priest, and to the remnant of the people, saying, 'Who is left among you who saw this temple in its former glory? And how do you see it now? In comparison with it, *is this* not in your eyes as nothing?

What are we seeing? We go by what we see. What we see affects us. Whereas we must live by Truth. **2 Cor 5:7**, "For we walk by faith, not by sight." **Hebrews 11:1-2**,"Now faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen. For by it the elders obtained a *good* testimony."

Haggai 2:4 'Yet now be strong, Zerubbabel,' says the LORD; 'and be strong, Joshua, son of Jehozadak, the high priest; and be strong, all you people of the land,' says the LORD, 'and work; for I *am* with you,' says the LORD of hosts.



Be strong – for I am with you.

Being strong in the Lord is <u>not an advice; it is a command to</u> <u>obey</u>.

Joshua 1:9, "Have I not commanded you? Be strong and of good courage; do not be afraid, nor be dismayed, for the LORD your God *is* with you wherever you go."

There is God's blessing in living in the strength of the Lord. **1 Chr 22:13**, "<u>Then you will prosper</u>, <u>if you take care to fulfil the</u> <u>statutes</u> and judgments with which the LORD charged Moses concerning Israel. Be strong and of good courage; do not fear nor be dismayed."

Be strong knowing who our God is- Ephesians 1:18-23

Haggai 2:5, "According to the word that I covenanted with you when you came out of Egypt, so My Spirit remains among you; do not fear!"

Matthew 24:35, "Heaven and earth will pass away, but My words will by no means pass away.

Zech 4:6, "So he answered and said to me: "This *is* the word of the LORD to Zerubbabel: 'Not by might nor by power, but by My Spirit,' Says the LORD of hosts."

John 14:16-17, "And I will pray the Father, and He will give you another Helper, that He may abide with you forever- the Spirit of truth, whom the world cannot receive, because it neither sees Him nor knows Him; but you know Him, for He dwells with you and will be in you."

God's word and His Spirit are with us

Haggai 2:6-8, "For thus says the LORD of hosts: 'Once more (it *is* a little while) I will shake heaven and earth, the sea and dry land; and I will shake all nations, and they shall come to the Desire of All Nations, and I will fill this temple with glory,' says the LORD of hosts. 'The silver *is* Mine, and the gold *is* Mine,' says the LORD of hosts."

Ref. Hebrews 12:18-29

Haggai 2:9, "The glory of this latter temple shall be greater than the former,' says the LORD of hosts. 'And in this place <u>I will give</u> <u>peace</u>,' says the LORD of hosts."

IV. FROM BEING DEFILED TO BECOMING A SIGNET RING – Haggai 2:10-23

The second year of Darius – Ninth month – The Twenty-fourth Day of the month (2:10; 18; 20)

Haggai 2:12–13, "If one carries holy meat in the fold of his garment, and with the edge he touches bread or stew, wine or oil, or any food, will it become holy?" ' "Then the priests answered and said, "No." And Haggai said, "If *one who is* unclean *because* of a dead body touches any of these, will it be unclean?" So the priests answered and said, "It shall be unclean."

Haggai 2:14, "Then Haggai answered and said," 'So is this people, and so is this nation before Me,' says the LORD, 'and so is every work of their hands; and what they offer there is unclean."

Ref Isaiah 1:11-20

Joel 2:12–13, "Now, therefore," says the LORD, "Turn to Me with all your heart, With fasting, with weeping, and with mourning." So rend your heart, and not your garments; Return to the LORD your God, For He *is* gracious and merciful, Slow to anger, and of great kindness; And He relents from doing harm. **1 Chr 28:9**, "As for you, my son Solomon, know the God of your father, and serve Him with a loyal heart and with a willing mind; for <u>the LORD searches all hearts and understands all the intent of the thoughts</u>. If you seek Him, He will be found by you; but if you forsake Him, He will cast you off forever.

Ezekiel 14:3-7 speaks on idols of the heart and the process of healing that the Lord was doing. Moving people from the state of defilement to the state of becoming His signet ring.

Haggai 2:15–17, "And now, carefully consider from this day forward: from before stone was laid upon stone in the temple of the LORD— since those *days*, when *one* came to a heap of twenty ephahs, there were *but* ten; when *one* came to the wine vat to draw out fifty baths from the press, there were *but* twenty. I struck you with blight and mildew and hail in all the labour of your hands; yet you did not *turn* to Me,' says the LORD.

Jeremiah 2:13, "For My people have committed two evils: They have forsaken Me, the fountain of living waters, *And* hewn themselves cisterns—broken cisterns that can hold no water.

Haggai 2:18-19, "Consider now from this day forward, from the twenty-fourth day of the ninth month, from the day that the foundation of the LORD's temple was laid—consider it: Is the seed still in the barn? As yet the vine, the fig tree, the pomegranate, and the olive tree have not yielded *fruit*. <u>But from</u> this day I will bless you." **Isaiah 32:15-18**, "Until the Spirit is poured upon us from on high, And the wilderness becomes a fruitful field, And the fruitful field is counted as a forest. Then justice will dwell in the wilderness, And righteousness remain in the fruitful field. The work of righteousness will be peace, And the effect of righteousness, quietness and assurance forever. My people will dwell in a peaceful habitation, In secure dwellings, and in quiet resting places,

Haggai 2:22-23, "I will overthrow the throne of kingdoms; I will destroy the strength of the Gentile kingdoms. I will overthrow the chariots And those who ride in them; The horses and their riders shall come down, Every one by the sword of his brother. 'In that day,' says the LORD of hosts, 'I will take you, Zerubbabel My servant, the son of Shealtiel,' says the LORD, 'and will make you like a signet *ring;* for I have chosen you,' says the LORD of hosts."

- Sunday School curriculum for Teens is from 'Resource Center' The rest of the classes are using the 'Children's Bible Ministry' curriculum. We have opted for this curriculum as there are a variety of visual teaching aids for teachers. Thus the lower classes did not receive their own student's copy but instead were handed out various work/activity sheets.

However, teacher's feedback for Beginners, Juniors and Teens classes suggest using Resource Centre books as it contains student's workbooks. On the other hand Primary class gave a positive response on the CBM curriculum stating good teaching content for teachers while there were no specific comments from Intermediate except that the teacher taught on relevant topics outside of the CBM curriculum.
