a choice would you allow yourself to let go of the past or look forward to the future? Let's try and get some perspective on this. Lot's wife could not resist the urge to look back even though the Lord had provided the way forward. She couldn't let go of the city that was engulfed in sin. The promise of a new life was not enough for her. Similarly, on the other hand, the Israelites during the exodus in Genesis had the same opportunity to look forward towards the Promised Land but along the way they were tested. Some failed and others who remained faithful lived to see God's faithfulness of the Promised Land. What can we observe and learn from these stories? The Covenant Baptist Church Dimapur has been serving the Lord for thirteen years and if I were to sum up God's grace in these years in a Hymn it would be, "Great is Thy Faithfulness". As I have often mentioned in the sermons- "This is God's Church". From the time of its inception, CBCD members have been through many ups and downs, joys and struggles, moments of laughter and grief, success and failures. While serving the Lord these past years we have also learned and unlearned many lessons through our collective experiences. And without a doubt we can acknowledge that God has been faithful and continues to be faithful (Ps. 100:5). As the year is drawing to a close and as we wait for 2024, I am pretty sure we are all experiencing mixed emotions. It might be different for each person depending on situations and circumstances. However, allow me to share a few of my thoughts. I had the privilege to share an Advent message some time back on the topic "No room for Christ, Yet room for us" (Lk. 2:1-7 & Jn. 14:2). In the scripture, the greatest story told was about the birth of Jesus and how he was kept in a manger. Despite His greatness it is important to note that there was no room for Him in the inns. THE Word is WORTH THE work

he spiritual discipline of Bible reading has been likened to a marathon rather than a sprint, a long trek up a mountain rather than a drive up to a mountain summit. In both disciplines, it is in the physical preparation, the trainings, the arduous and the slow trek uphill where character is built and joy is found at the finish line and the wonderful views at the mountain top. The psalmist wrote in Psalms 119:18, "Open my eyes, that I may behold wondrous things out of your law."

Many of us skim through our Bible reading because we want the thrill of spiritual feeling without the labour of spiritual thought- no effort made to understand the actual meaning of the scriptural texts and meditating on them. In doing so, we miss out on what the Psalmist points out- we fail to open our eyes and our senses, we avoid meditating on deep thoughts and miss out on the wondrous truths found hidden in God's law. Paul exhorts Timothy that meditation of Scripture will unveil insights into things of God by the Lord (2 Tim. 2:7)

Here are a few practical steps inspired by the works of Scott Hubbard and David Burnette on how to find joy in the Word of God through the unhurried and detailed work of in-depth Bible study.

READ DEEP AND WIDE

As you plan to read the Bible regularly, be aware of two unhelpful extremes. First, there's a danger of racing through a one-year Bible reading plan, dipping in and out of multiple books each day, without stopping to think carefully about the truths you're encountering. We should take the time to study and meditate on God's promises, his awe-inspiring attributes, and the saving work of Jesus Christ.

The second danger is to focus all your time on your favourite passages, books, and topics in the Bible. This can leave you with an impoverished view of God and the Christian life. Every Christian needs to be exposed to "the whole counsel of God" (Acts 20:27).

On the Emmaus Road, when Jesus finally reveals himself to Cleopas and the other disciple, the two men say, "Did not our hearts burn within us as he opened to us the Scriptures?" And by opened, they mean this: "[Jesus] interpreted to them in all the Scriptures the things concerning himself" (Luke 24:27). Jesus took the men on an Old Testament tour, interpreting it's Christcentered meaning. In other words, He led an in-depth Bible study with them. Then, and only then, did fire kindle within. Before their hearts burned with love, their minds brightened with truth.

On the Emmaus road, what Scriptures did Jesus open to Cleopas and his friend? Luke writes, "Beginning with Moses and all the Prophets, He interpreted to them in *all the Scriptures* the things concerning Himself" (Luke 24:27). He took them to Genesis and Isaiah, Leviticus and Kings, Deuteronomy and Psalms, showing how his whole story reveals his whole glory.

Christian joy becomes more whole the more we read the Bible whole: whole chapters, whole books, whole testaments.

TAKE IT SIOW

On a mountain, there are certain views that can only be appreciated while walking slow, as opposed to driving past by car. The gushing small stream, wild flowers, the birds and small animals that you come across- these pitstops are what make the trek memorable. Similarly, if we come to the Bible looking mainly for a quick driveby-eager to complete our Bible study plan or only read the Bible when we need sentimental or emotional support, we will drive right past the beauty hidden in scripture.

STUDY THE WORD WITH INTENTION, NOT SENTIMENT

Martyn Lloyd-Jones, in a sermon on Hebrews 12:5-11, shares some strong words for those who read Scripture only in what he calls "a sentimental manner":

"There are many people who read the Scriptures in a purely sentimental manner. They are in trouble and they do not know what to do. They say, "I will read a psalm. It is so soothing — 'The Lord is my Shepherd; I shall not want." They make it a kind of incantation and take the Psalms as another person takes a drug".

Patience is, indeed, the virtue many of us may need most in our Bible reading. For the deepest joy, the kind "inexpressible and filled with glory" (1 Peter 1:8), comes only to those who prayerfully and thoughtfully plod the path. They read the Bible to *know* what God says and

how He says it - in order that they might then *feel* that knowledge become worship by the power of the indwelling Spirit.

Benefits of studying and obeying the Word of God

God uses His Word to speak to us (2 Samuel 3:21), to shape our thoughts, desires, attitudes and reveal Himself to us. All Scripture is God-breathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness, so that the servant of God may be thoroughly equipped for every good work (2 Tim. 3:16-17).

- 1. The glory of God is revealed through the Word of God (2 Corinth. 3:18, 4:6)
- 2. The Word of God gives life (John 1:1-3, 6:63,68)
- 3. Wise is the man who builds his life by labouring to dig on the Word of God and walking in the Word. (Matthew 7:24-27)
- 4. The one who correctly interprets the Word of God is an approved worker of God (2 Tim. 2:15)
- 5. The Word of God is the path to life, fullness of joy and pleasures of God. (Psalms 16:11)

One's affection for the Word of God measures his relationship with God (John 8:47). Our aim is to grow in our love for God and Bible study is a means to that great end. Resist then, the urge to drive through your devotions. Glory awaits those who walk.

More about Jesus; in His Word, Holding communion with my Lord; Hearing His voice in every line, Making each faithful saying mine.

WHERE ARE THE MEN OF GOD?

NAVIGATING THE SPIRITUAL LANDSCAPE IN SEARCH OF MEN OF GOD

The question is rhetorical in the sense that it challenges and calls for men of God to rise above the cacophony of contemporary challenges, to live with unwavering faith, and to embrace the responsibilities inherent in their calling. As I write this, it has dawned on me that, most of all - I want to find a man of God within myself, to walk with God everyday with all my shortcomings and failings, continually seeking God to depend on Him more with each passing day. I want to be THAT man.

AS HUSBANDS
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Becoming a Titus 2 Woman

he book of Titus was both a personal epistle and a pastoral letter written by apostle Paul. In this epistle, Paul gave instructions to Titus on several matters, including social standards of various groups. The instructions for women were as much a part of those given, and so it is beneficial to look at the background and bigger picture before looking at what it means to be a Titus 2 woman.

Titus was a Greek, one of Paul's own converts and co-workers. Titus 1:5 tells us that Paul left Titus in charge of the churches in Crete which were founded by Paul and his co-workers. These churches needed pastoral care, and Titus was entrusted with the mission as Paul's representative to combat false doctrines, place strong and dependable pastoral leaders in charge, and impart Paul's instructions to the Christians there. After this was accomplished, Titus was to rejoin Paul in Nicopolis.

There were Jews in Crete who tried to hinder the work by teaching that Christians should observe the Jewish ceremonial laws (1:10-14). Titus was trusted by Paul to tackle this difficult matter. In addition to instructions on handling false teachers, directives were given in the following verses for various groups. It is within these verses that we find specific instructions given for the women (Titus 2:3-5).

Paul laid out the qualifications of elders and their appointment. He also gave instructions for older and younger men, for older and younger women, and instructions for slaves. Elwell and Yarbrough observe that, "Paul is concerned that all age groups of men and

women relate to each other in ways that will show the love of Christ and the truth of the gospel." 1

All believers, no matter the age or gender, have a part to play and an example to set in church and society. These instructions of social standards concerned the affairs of ordinary life. Each group of people were addressed and instructed specifically and equally. This epistle shows us that the church is made up of imperfect people. Every group of people have their own set of temptations and opportunities, but each one is urged to strive to live Godly lives.

Let us now look at the instructions given to the women. Older women likewise are to be reverent in their behavior, not malicious gossips nor enslaved to much wine, teaching what is good (2:3). Some translations say, 'reverent in behavior' while others say 'becometh holiness.' According to the Jamieson, Fausset, and Brown commentary, 'becometh holiness' is to "becometh women consecrated to God." Some of them were 'malicious gossips' or 'slanderers' or 'false accusers' – this was a besetting sin of some elderly women then and this is true even today.

Next, a common failing of the older women in the culture then was being "enslaved to much wine." In Crete, the women had a liability to these excesses so severely that the verb used here signifies 'bondage.' Paul knew that this had to be addressed and instructed Titus to do so accordingly. The older women were further instructed

to encourage the young women to love their husbands, to love their children, to be sensible, pure, workers at home, kind, being subject to their own husbands, so that the word of God will not be dishonored (2:4,5).

This was a specific charge and instruction given to the older women: to teach and encourage the young women. The young women had a God-given position of influence and assistance to their husbands and children, and so for them the instructions began with home matters. The admonishment was to love with the self-giving sacrificial love of Christ. The young women were further encouraged to have the attitudes of being discreet and chaste (sober, self-restrained), and the skills of homemaking, and were instructed to submit to their husbands.

These believers – men and women and young and old – were given instructions about faith and conduct. The basis for the instructions was one goal in particular: to keep the word of God from being maligned (2:5).

From the first few verses in the first chapter and towards the end of the epistle, Paul makes it clear that the grace of God in Christ is the incentive for Christians to live holy lives (1:1-3; 3:4-7).

The book of Titus is a useful handbook for recognizing and understanding that we have struggles and temptations as well as responsibilities and privileges, just as they did in Paul's time. The principles and truths of Paul's instructions are just as relevant today as they were then. To become a Titus 2 woman is an important process – made possible only through the saving grace of God and dependence on the Holy Spirit. God gave Himself for us, to redeem us from every lawless deed, to purify for Himself His own special people who are zealous for good works (2:14,15). The love and grace of God is our encouragement and motivation to conduct ourselves in such a way that we can be worthy examples to others, and that God will be glorified in our lives.

he idea of Sunday school was initially established for education and discipline of lesser privileged and orphaned children in 1780's. Today, it exists for holistic spiritual discipleship and biblical learning regardless of a child's background. Parents and guardians send children to Sunday school with the hope that they grow to love the Lord. Thus, Sunday school essentially disciple children through age appropriate approaches which otherwise is difficult to fulfill through the adult church.

As we review on Sunday school programs, here are 5 foundational areas we can affirm on that impacts children's spiritual growth.

I. CAPTIVATING BIBLE LESSONS

The basic and most important way to make an impact on spiritual growth among children is to inculcate consistent weekly Bible lessons. This is efficient as we can feed the children in drips rather than in gulps. Bible lessons are taught through different methods like storytelling, role-plays, visual aids like videos or puppets and object lessons using common props through which a child can understand the truth about God. This prepares them to respond and receive Christ into their lives. As *Romans* 10:17 says "faith comes by hearing the Word of God."

2. CREATIVE MEMORIZING OF SCRIPTURE

For God's Word to take root, a child is encouraged to memorize scriptures. There are several ways to teach memory verses in a fun and interactive manner. We can incorporate play in the process which is a child's natural instinct to respond to. Remembering scripture will allow them to personally witness how God's word is a reality during good times and even in difficult times. Hiding God's word in one's heart allows a child to mature spiritually as they begin to make God-honoring choices. Psalms 119:11 says 'Thy Word have I hidden in my heart that I might not sin against Thee.'

3. EXPRESSIVE PRAISE AND WORSHIP

Colossians 3:16 says singing is one way through which God's Word richly resides in us. Singing is also a profound

way to honour God with our mouths. Singing can be expressed in various ways (action songs, choreography, praise and worship) which effectively draw their attention to focus on God. Through songs, basic biblical truths can also be reinforced to guide a child. Thus, singing praises steadily cultivates spiritual maturity.

4. INTERACTIVE SUNDAY SCHOOL PROGRAMS

Sunday school allows children to be a friend and also make friends with their peers. Programs like Vacation Bible School, retreats, outings and outdoor activities create an environment where children can experience the Christian life in the mundane things (playing games with integrity, forgiving someone who hurts you, being friends to the friendless, helping someone in need or praying for someone who is sad/hurt/sick). They can also witness exemplary lives of elders/seniors or discover spiritual friends who influence them positively. This enables them to exercise tangible faith that in turn fosters spiritual maturity. *Hebrews* 10:24–25 talks about not forsaking meeting up in order to stir up love and good works.

5. INTENTIONAL COUNSELING AND PRAYER

Bonding with children and praying over them makes an impact on children's spiritual growth. Leading them to Christ by providing periodical counseling will encourage growth. We can pray relevantly according to their age and understanding. For example VBS 2022 had a prayer station dedicated for conversation and prayers. This is another way to bring children to salvation and nurture spiritual growth for the long run.

We believe at CBCD we emphasize on these areas but we can do more in the area of counseling and prayer. It is our deepest desire to see children give their lives to Christ and live in freedom of God's transforming love. Children are capable of radiating godly influence in their families and society as 1 Timothy 4:12 rightly puts, 'Don't let anyone look down on you because you are young (children) but set an example for the believers in speech, in conduct, in love, in faith and in purity.'

Are Christian Teens Influencing or being Influenced by the World?

"We cannot always build the future for our youth, but we can build our youth for the future" - Franklin D. Roosevelt

oday's young generation as we call, "The Gen-Z generation", are influenced in such a manner that they cannot sustain themselves without the influx of western culture, the types of movies they watch, way of dressing, use of language, listening to music etc. They are highly motivated by highlights which are displayed in social media/magazines which push them to want to become an iconic figure in the media world. The young people of this generation are highly resourceful, yet vulnerable as they navigate today's hypercompetitive world.

Some of the following key factors which play a key role in influencing teens by this materialistic world are as follows:

1. Misguided by Social Media: Social media has now become a giant factor that is leading so many teens into a world of illusion. It serves good and bad purposes, depending on how we utilise it. It is a good servant but a bad master. For

example,

Google knows more than what you know, Amazon/Flipkart already knows what you want, Facebook, Instagram and WhatsApp have become a platform to express one's feeling and current situation. Teenagers try to emulate their social media role models and the outcome pushes them into depression, cybercrime, cyber bullying, invasion of privacy, social anxiety, isolation and suicidal thoughts. Over access of social media has built up a virtual prison, where one assumes he can escape from loneliness, but in reality they end up feeling more lonely and isolated from the real world. Social Media is also becoming a hub of immorality, through excessive gaming, watching of pornography etc. Parents need to adopt certain restrictions in these situations which will help young people use social media responsibly.

- 2. Shift of Culture: We have been heavily influenced by western culture and it has impacted us in so many ways-such as our eating habits, way of dressing, way of decorating our home, way of communication etc. At the same time, we are also witnessing a deterioration of our own cultural values and ethics. Issues such as gender identity crisis and legalizing immoral laws (such as gay marriage, abortion etc.) are totally contradictory to Christian principles. This warrants a need to have an understanding of these issues from a biblical perspective and talking about such matters to them from a young age.
- **3. Absence of Christ-Centred Family:** As per one report, it is said that 51% of American youths claimed to be a Christian, yet only 8% displayed the beliefs and habits of committed Christians and also 46% of Christians have never read the Bible and still some sections of young people believed that they don't have

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the responsibility to show their faith.

So many parents are failing in their role of parenthood towards their children when they are supposed to nurture them. The practice of fellowshipping together through family prayer, the practice of Bible study or teaching how to do quiet time is rarely observed in today's context by believing that it's the responsibility of the church leaders. Parents who work overtime at their office and personal engagements leave the children feeling left out and fail to check on their children's spiritual growth. Providing for their children's education and personal needs is necessary but feeding them with spiritual food should be the core foundation of every family.

Parents should impart Christian ethics and values at an early age so that the children grow firm in their faith.

4. Rigidity of laws: Various factors in our traditional churches such as strict imposition of traditional laws and principles upon the youth and being over-critical without empathy directly discourages many youth from

attending church services. The lack of personal pastoral care among young believers is also lacking. The issues and challenges faced by today's youth are different from the issues faced ten years back. The leaders of today's church need to mentor the youth just as the Apostle Paul mentored young Timothy.

5. Mushrooming of independent churches: The birth of multiple independent Churches is also one of the factors which is creating a dilemma for young people on which church to follow and which to not follow. For instance, many churches in the west have approved of immoral laws and principles within the church such as same sex marriage or LGBTQ on the ground of humanity. Instead, the church should use the pulpit as a platform to teach the truth rather than comfort the world with lies for their personal benefit.

Above all, we as a family in Christ need to develop an attitude of empathy and care for Generation Z. They are growing up in times of uncertainty and chaos and face massive challenges. Advancements in science and technology have been a key factor affecting the lives of our young people in many aspects. May we all continue to extend our helping hand to this group of people through prayer because what we do for them at this age will determine their future.
